Despite the Gulf War Syndrome, which we believe caused his leukemia and his infant son's heart defect, Sterling loved his country and never regretted having served. "Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends." John 15:13. We love him now and forever and he will be missed here on earth. The team rushed to get the injured woman out of harm's way, but a rock "the size of a refrigerator" smashed down onto the group. Three died: Backus, Harrison and John Augenstein, 41, of Seattle. Wayne McCourt of Tacoma was flown to a Seattle hospital with head injuries; the park service said he will recover. Word came to Terry and Marie Harrison, Mark's parents, while they were vacationing in South Carolina. "I'm still in a fog," Terry Harrison said. "Mark knew about risks.</p> <p>He was in the Marines, was over with Desert Storm ... And I keep thinking about his motorcycle, how it used to worry me so much when he rode that thing. I ding-donged him till he got rid of it, because it was too dangerous." Harrison shook his head. "I knew he was climbing mountains. I told him, son, just be very, very careful up there. But he loved those mountains. Loved them."</p> <p>Tim Manns, spokesman for the park service, said no one is to blame for the tragedy. "These are steep mountains, and there are things that can happen even when people have a great amount of skill and the best equipment," he said.</p> <p>Mark Harrison graduated in 1988 from Penn-Trafford High School. He loved hiking and camping. "I'd drop him off with his dog and all his equipment, out on Route 31 in the afternoon, down on the Westmoreland side of the mountain. The 744th Transportation Company left for the war Jan. 10 from Westover Air Force Base in Chicopee, Mass.</p> <p>Residents of this Upper Valley town at the base of snowy Mount Cardigan said they knew something was wrong when they saw a lone National Guardsman enter town about 7 a.m. asking directions to Freda Washburn's tidy little green house on Canaan Street, just above the center of town.</p> <p>Washburn, Hector's mother, is said to have been about ready to leave for work at Verax in Lebanon when the officer knocked on her door.</p> <p>Hector's father, Eugene, described his son as a quiet boy who loved hunting, fishing and serving in the Guard.</p> <p>"He had a good feeling about going over there, and he was devoted to doing his job," Eugene Hector said.</p> <p>Wade Hector was graduated from Lebanon High School in 1986 and served in Germany during a three-year Army stint. He joined the Guard in August 1989, and also worked for a paint contractor.</p> <p>He was engaged to be married.</p>

"It's kind of a shock," said Dave Faulkner, who was Hector's guidance counselor and friend at Lebanon High School.

"He was a very quiet, hard-working and dedicated young man who would come to school every day and do his best. He was very dedicated to the country and eager to serve," Faulkner said.

Hector enjoyed sports but was more "of an old farm boy who liked to work with his hands and on mechanical things," Faulkner recalled. Last summer, he lived with his mother in Canaan.

Friends said that Hector enjoyed hard work and was particularly fond of small engines. Last summer, he spent much of his free time either riding or working on his dirt bike, said Mike Eastman.

"He was really a friendly kid," he said.

Even those who did not know Hector or his family said they were distraught by the news.

"It's upsetting," said Ellen Rocke, a clerk at the local grocery store.

"I don't know the kid, but it's something you don't think will ever happen to you," or someone from such a small town, she said.

Emily Heuss, Canaan town clerk and a friend of the family, said Hector was one of three boys, and she said she believed he was the middle child in the family.

His mother, Freda, had been in the service for some time before moving to Canaan about seven years ago, she said.

"She's a very patriotic person ... She was in the Air Force herself," said Heuss.

Those values were instilled in the children, but not in a pretentious way, said Faulkner. Hector's brother, Eric, a Lebanon resident, is also a man of great principle, he said.

"There's nothing false about that family," he said.

Neighbors said they were surprised to hear Hector was involved in the war in Saudi Arabia, because there was no mention of it by his mother.

"We will all miss him very much," said Faulkner. He said that Hector was a true patriot who believed strongly in the principles of freedom and dedication.

Hector was 'Like Family'.

Wade Elliott Hector was an outgoing, easy person to make friends with, said Spec. 4 Albert Johnson of Deering, who became close friends with Hector when the two were sent to Saudi Arabia with the New Hampshire Army National Guard 744th Transportation Company.

Hector, 22, of Canaan, died in a truck accident Thursday in Saudi Arabia. Todd Ritch, 20, of Charlestown also died in the crash.

	<p>Hector was a truck driver, while Johnson's first assignment was as a truck mechanic. Johnson later became a wrecker operator.</p> <p>Johnson, who is home on emergency leave because his father is seriously ill, only became aware of his good friend's death when a reporter called to ask if he knew Hector.</p> <p>"I'm sorry," he said. Hines, 37, of Monroeville, home two months from military duty in hurricane-ravaged Mississippi, stopped his eastbound pickup truck near the Swissvale exit about 3:30 a.m. and got out to warn oncoming traffic of a hit-and-run collision that had occurred moments before.</p> <p>State police said Mr. Hines, a staff sergeant with the Pennsylvania Air National Guard and former Navy Seabee who served in the 1991 Persian Gulf War, was standing in the right lane with a flashlight when he was struck by a vehicle that continued moving at a high rate of speed. About eight witnesses gave police a description of the red-and-white vehicle that hit Mr. Hines, a former deputy constable and volunteer firefighter. Police said they located the damaged Chevrolet Blazer about 11:30 a.m. and arrested Jesse Hillebrecht, 23, of the Hill District, after he returned to the vehicle. Authorities said Mr. Hillebrecht was driving with a suspended license.</p> <p>Relatives said they weren't surprised that Mr. Hines stopped at the accident scene while returning from his late shift as a welder at a coal plant in Shippingport, Beaver County. Andrea Hines, his wife of nine years, said he frequently helped motorists with flat tires or other problems along the road. She said her husband "thought with his heart." State Trooper Robin Mungo said the driver of the car from the first accident abandoned his vehicle in the right eastbound lane. She said Mr. Hines parked his pickup truck on the berm and stood in the right lane of the highway with the flashlight to keep oncoming traffic from hitting the abandoned vehicle. Police released a description of the vehicle that struck Mr. Hines and asked for tips. Trooper Mungo said a caller alerted police to the Blazer at a Hill District service station. Debris from the crime scene was matched to the car, and Mr. Hillebrecht was arrested after he returned to the vehicle and talked with officers, Trooper Mungo said. He was charged with homicide by vehicle and leaving the scene of an accident, among other charges. Trooper Mungo had no details about the first hit-and-run accident and declined to say why Mr. Hillebrecht's driver's license had been suspended. Mr. Hillebrecht does not own the Blazer; Trooper Mungo said she didn't have the owner's name.</p> <p>Mr. Hines, a 1987 graduate of Deer Lakes High School, had a record of volunteering. "If there was a need, he tried to fill it," a cousin, Steve Winslow, said.</p> <p>After high school, Mr. Hines enlisted in the Navy and became a Seabee, or member of the Naval Construction Force. He served in Saudi Arabia and Kuwait during Operation Desert Shield and Operation Desert Storm, his wife said. He later joined the Air National Guard.</p> <p>At the time of his death, he was assigned to the Civil Engineering Squadron with the 171st Air Refueling Wing based at Pittsburgh International Airport. Mr. Hines returned two months ago from a five-month training program in Gulfport, Miss. After Hurricane Katrina hit the</p>

And in a letter to his girlfriend, he said he would propose once he returned from the war.</p> <p>Hoage, 19, of Corona, was killed Saturday in Saudi Arabia when a grenade accidentally went off as his Marine battalion was preparing for the ground offensive in Kuwait. One other person was injured, according to military reports.</p> <p>Hoage's parents, Roger and Mellie Hoage of Corona, were told of his death on Saturday. According to a report they received on the incident, their son was killed instantly.</p> <p>Since learning of his death, the Hoages have been trying to gather more information. While their son's death did not come in combat, they said he died honorably and for a just cause.</p> <p>"I fully support the action of the U.S. troops over there . . . I believe Adam was supposed to be where he was," his mother said.</p> <p>On Monday, friends gathered at the Hoage home to offer support to the family. Mellie Hoage said her husband, a retired Hughes Aircraft director, along with many other friends, were too distraught to talk about the tragedy.</p> <p>Hoage graduated from Norco High School in 1989 and Auburndale Junior High School in 1986. Flags flew at half mast at both schools Monday, as well as the main office of the Corona-Norco Unified School District.</p> <p>School officials described Hoage as a good student, quiet, friendly and popular. An entry in his ninth-grade yearbook called him the student with the</p>

	<p>"best smile," said Judy Horan, the assistant principal at Auburndale.</p> <p>Hoage and friends often went to the Corona National Golf Course, which had been closed, or to a nearby riverbed to shoot BB guns. He started collecting rifles and handguns when he was in the eighth grade, said A.J. Stoyanowski, 20, a friend who had known Hoage since kindergarten.</p> <p>Shortly after graduation, Hoage signed up for the Marines. Although he was undecided on the career path he was going to take, his mother said that he had made up his mind to spend a few years in the service.</p> <p>"It was his decision and he did it," Mellie Hoage said. "In fact, he told us after he had already signed up."</p> <p>Stoyanowski said that Hoage thought joining the military would be a good move instead of staying in Corona and working odd jobs.</p> <p>"It just seemed like a good alternative," he said. "Whoever thinks this can happen?"</p> <p>On a visit last summer, Hoage told Stoyanowski that he was "having a blast" in the military, but he hoped to be transferred into another job, such as military police.</p> <p>Hoage's home base was at the Marine Corps Air Station in Kaneohe Bay, Hawaii, but he had spent much of his time in Okinawa, Japan. "Since they said he was missing in action, we had all hoped for the best. But I think deep in our hearts we all knew he was dead. But, of course, we didn't want to admit that," Spurlock said Saturday.

"We were expecting it. It's been tough all the way through, not knowing. Now we know it's a little better, but it still rough," Holland's father, Douglas Holland, said.

Holland, 42, an Air Force pilot since 1974, flew in the first wave of intensive air raids when Operation Desert Storm began Jan. 16.

He graduated from Bastrop High School in 1966 and from Northwestern State University in 1970. He taught industrial arts and drafting at Alexandria Senior High School before joining the Air Force.

La.'s only combat fatality laid to rest in Arkansas  
HAMBURG, Ark. -- This is a quiet place for a hero to rest.

Louisiana's only confirmed combat death, Lt. Col. Donnie Holland, was buried Saturday next to his grandfather amid piney woods, sprinkled with springtime dogwoods, near this community of 3,300 in southeast Arkansas.

About 300 gathered in Promised Land Cemetery for a burial with full military honors that had followed a 40-minute memorial service earlier in Bastrop, Holland's hometown, 37 miles away.

"We have etched in our memories the picture of a true Desert Storm hero," the Rev. Jim Taylor of Cherry Ridge Baptist Church told about 700 at the memorial at First Baptist, Bastrop.

Holland, a 42-year-old F-15 fighter pilot, was killed in a bombing mission in the first attack against Iraq Jan. 17. He had been listed as missing in action until last week, when his remains were turned over to coalition forces in Iraq.

His was the second aircraft to go down in combat in the war.

Only a few words were spoken at the cemetery. The silence was broken by a lone bugler playing "Taps," the startling crack of a 21-gun salute and a dramatic fly-over of four F-15s in the missing man formation.

All eyes turned to the north as the four planes glided toward the cemetery. At

	<p>the last moment one fighter broke away, thundering off alone as Holland's widow, Cindy, watched.</p> <p>Air Force representatives presented her with the U.S. flag that had draped the casket. Heather Holland, 14, and Douglas Holland, Lt. Holland's father, also received flags.
