<p>Ishmael-Wolford, James</p>	<p>Having recently completed flight school in Pennsylvania, James Ishmael-Wolford aspired to pilot a Black Hawk helicopter in Iraq. His dream never left the ground.</p> <p>A member of the Oklahoma Army National Guard, Ishmael-Wolford, 31, died Monday of injuries he sustained June 14 in a three-vehicle traffic accident in Tulsa. "He got his goal completed, but he never got all the way there," Terry Ishmael said of his nephew. "He was just so proud. "It was unreal. It was just one of those things."</p> <p>The crash happened as Ishmael-Wolford was heading north on U.S. 169 after leaving the Army National Guard base in Tulsa, his uncle said. Witnesses said traffic had begun to slow when Ishmael-Wolford locked up his brakes and bumped the vehicle in front of him, Tulsa Police Officer Scott Walton said. His vehicle then was struck from behind, sending it into the median and ejecting him, Walton said. Ishmael said his nephew suffered multiple injuries, including a skull fracture, three broken vertebrae in his neck, a broken leg, a dislocated shoulder and hip and five broken ribs. Despite the trauma, Ishmael-Wolford made progress at St. John Medical Center in Tulsa after the crash, his uncle said. But one of his kidneys ultimately stopped functioning, and he went into cardiac arrest, Ishmael said. The results of a private autopsy are pending, a spokeswoman with the state Medical Examiner's Office said. Ishmael said, "Everything just snowballed on him." He said Ishmael-Wolford's family moved to Collinsville from Michigan in the early 1980s.</p> <p>Doug Ishmael, a member of the 138th Fighter Wing in Tulsa, said his brother had been in the military for 11 years -- first in the Air Force's Active Guard/Reserve, serving in Operation Desert Storm and at bases in Washington, D.C.; New Jersey and Korea, and then in the Army.</p> <p>When not in uniform, Ishmael-Wolford immersed himself in activities such as basketball, snowboarding, fishing, deer hunting and Motocross. "He was outdoorsy all the way around," his uncle said. Doug Ishmael described his brother as strong-willed, open-minded and "very patriotic."</p>
