Kahalewai was wounded Nov. 21 in Baghdad by a roadside bomb. <p>Kugler, Everett Clark</p>	<p>Dr. Everett Clark Kuglar, a prominent Augusta psychiatrist, who helped transform the state's mental health care system in the 1960s, will be remembered for his innovative approach to caring for the mentally ill, his patriotism, and his devotion, friends and family said Saturday.</p> <p>"He felt strongly about his community and generated a lot of new ideas and new things in making treatment better for the mentally ill," his wife, Nancy, said.</p> <p>Dr. Kuglar died Thursday at Doctors Hospital, where he had been admitted for pneumonia, she said. He was 72.</p> <p>Combined with multiple other health problems including a heart condition, it was too much for him to overcome, she said.</p> <p>Dr. Kuglar was well-known in Augusta and the state for his contribution to mental health.</p> <p>One of his major contributions came during the 1960s, when state health officials moved to decentralize where the mentally ill were treated. Until then, most were hospitalized in Milledgeville at what is now known as Central State Hospital. The plan was to develop a network of smaller state hospitals that could treat patients closer to home.</p> <p>In 1969, the Georgia Regional Hospital at Augusta, now known as East Central Regional Hospital, opened and was headed up by Dr. Kuglar, who served as superintendant there until he retired in 1990. It was the second hospital of its kind in the state.</p> <p>His first hire was Brian Mulherin, a friend from the military reserves and a man whose first wife he treated for bipolar disorder as a psychiatric resident at Medical College of Georgia Hospital.</p> <p>Mr. Mulherin, 83, the director of personnel at East Central Regional Hospital for 31 years, said Dr. Kuglar was a "pioneer" in advocating for outpatient treatment as opposed to long-term hospitalization.</p> <p>"With new drugs and new therapy so much could be done for them, we didn't have to just put them away," Mr. Mulherin said.</p> <p>Dr. Kuglar also helped to establish the Community Mental Health Center, now known as Serenity Behavioral Health Systems, in Augusta in 1974.</p> <p>One of the state's first forensic psychiatrists, Dr. Kuglar also was a prominent figure in the legal community and testified frequently in criminal cases.</p> <p>In 1991, he served as the commander of the 382nd Field Hospital in Saudi Arabia at the King Fahd National Guard Hospital during Operation Desert Storm.</p> <p>Retired Army Col.
