<p>Nisely, Scott</p>	<p>Marshalltown, Ia. - Sgt. 1st Class Scott Nisely was remembered Monday as a good father and husband, a friend to many, and a patriot who loved to serve his country.</p> <p>Nisely, 48, is the oldest soldier from the Iowa Army National Guard to be killed in the war in Iraq. He died Sept. 30 in a gunbattle with Iraqi insurgents near Al Asad that also killed Sgt. Kampha Sourivong, 20, of Iowa City. Sourivong was buried Sunday. Both were members of Company C, 1st Battalion, 133rd Infantry in Iowa Falls.</p> <p>An overflow crowd of more than 700 attended Nisely's funeral at First Baptist Church in Marshalltown, where last year he told a group of schoolchildren that if he didn't return home from the war, he would see them again in heaven.</p> <p>Friends and relatives recalled Nisely as an extraordinary man who relished military service and its brotherhood so much that he enlisted in the Guard in 2002 after a 22-year career with the U.S. Marine Corps on active duty and as a reservist. He joined the Guard as a corporal, even though it required a steep reduction from his Marine rank of major, his son, Justin Nisely, said.</p> <p>"He was a great leader and friend. Everything about him glowed," said James Williams, 41, of Hampton, who served with Nisely in the Guard. Both men had prior service in the Marines. They hit it off when Nisely joined his Guard unit, Williams said.</p> <p>Nisely, an infantry veteran of Operation Desert Storm, lay in an open casket before the funeral in his Marine dress blues with his ceremonial officer's sword.</p> <p>There was no sign of protesters at the funeral. Members of a Kansas church picketed Nisely's visitation service Sunday.</p> <p>Nisely had worked for 12 years with the U.S. Postal Service in Ames, Des Moines, and Marshalltown as a supervisor, clerk and letter carrier. A procession of 26 postal delivery trucks followed the hearse to the edge of Marshalltown after the funeral. Nisely's body was taken to Syracuse, Neb., where he grew up. He will be buried there Wednesday.</p> <p>Fred George of Marshalltown knew Nisely as a church member and letter carrier. He said that after he once joked about letter carriers who simply tossed his mail into his mailbox, Nisely began to deliver his letters neatly wrapped with a rubber band.</p>

	<p>Nisely's wife, Geri, who spoke at the funeral, described her husband as a sensitive man who would tell her how much he missed her at night while he was in Iraq. Although she had spent her married life as a military spouse, his deployment to Iraq made the past year the most difficult, she said.</p> <p>"I appreciate all the support we have received. It has been incredible," she said.</p> <p>Survivors include Nisley's son, Justin, of Greeley, Colo.; a daughter, Sarah Swinton of Ames; Nisley's parents, J.C. and Norma Jean Nisely of Syracuse; and three brothers.</p> <p>Before he left for Iraq, Nisely had placed one of his military identification tags on his drum set at First Baptist Church, where he was part of a "worship team" that provides music. Mourners clapped their hands and sang as Monday's service began, although some of Nisely's fellow worship team members wiped tears from their eyes.</p> <p>"We believe with all of our hearts that Scott is in heaven, and that is a blessed thing," the Rev. <p>Norris, Robert David</p>	<p>They remember one brother as the man who, upon discovering that a family of strangers had been evicted at Christmas, made sure the children had presents and a tree. They remember the other as the man who removed the gloves from his own freezing hands and handed them to a suffering teammate with this simple statement: "We'll share."</p> <p>Mark and Robert Norris chose separate paths in life and may have been about as different in outward appearance as two brothers could be, but loved ones say each had a generous spirit that made it seem as if they "shared one heart." The former Broome County residents were eulogized during a service Saturday at a church along a Delaware highway, five days after being gunned down in a Philadelphia waterfront office building along with retired Broome sheriff's deputy James M. Reif of Endicott. Police said a Delaware man killed the three, claiming they had bilked him out of \$200,000 in a business deal that involved the 2006 purchase of the former Heritage Country Club in Union, then turned one of the two guns he carried on himself. Friends, family and colleagues struggled this weekend with the grief and frustration that comes when the photos on the altar are those of people in their prime. Reif, Robert Norris and Mark Norris -- 42, 41 and 46, respectively -- are among the 45 people slain in Philadelphia in the first 45 days of 2007.</p> <p>"This is the hardest thing I've ever done," said Officer John Wagenhoffer,</p>

who had been a colleague of Robert Norris with the New Castle (Del.) County Police before Norris left to go into business. "To do the eulogy for someone you know not only as a friend," he said, choking back a sob as hundreds of mourners listened inside the Cornerstone United Methodist Church on a small rise in a town just east of the Delaware-Maryland border, "but as a mentor, as a co-worker and a business partner ..."

Mark David Norris, who relatives described as "about 5 feet 11 inches and 160 pounds soaking wet," attended Susquehanna Valley High School in Conklin before enlisting in the Marine Corps and coming to Philadelphia as a recruiter.

Norris turned 46 on Thanksgiving and lived in Pilesgrove, N.J., with longtime companion Douglas Park and their dog Pepe. After his arrival in the Philadelphia area, Norris taught himself to be a painter and opened a painting business, then moved into the design field. In 1997, he opened Zigzag Net Inc., a firm that did marketing and technology work, including using Norris' gift for developing Web sites. Friends remembered his design skills translating to a personal style that included a love for cars and shoes, and for generating and disposing of income. "He truly didn't care when it came to money," said Richard L. Chapman, director of the Juvenile Justice Center of Philadelphia; Norris served on his board of directors. He told of Norris purchasing everything from tinsel to a television for a family evicted at Christmastime. "He would go and spend thousands of dollars ... to help people."

The center, which provides support to disadvantaged children and families, hopes to honor Mark Norris by naming one of its facilities in his honor, Chapman said. Robert Edward "Bobbie" Norris, who would have turned 42 in May, packed about 240 pounds on a frame 2 inches shorter than his brother's. New Castle Lt. Vaughn Bond, who graduated from the police academy with Norris in 1992, said Norris would sometimes joke with him by lifting the back of Bond's Suzuki Samurai off the ground. Norris parlayed football and track success at Union-Endicott High School in the early 1980s to a role as an all-conference running back at the University of Delaware and a National Football League tryout.

He married college sweetheart Patricia Rohm, fathered three children and spent 14 years as a policeman before following an entrepreneurial bent that would see him buy and sell real estate and patent Robert's Ramp, a device that helps wheelchair users escape burning buildings. Norris lived in Newark, Del., with Patricia and their children Casey, 15; Tyler, 13; and Brie, 8.

He served with the Marines in Operation Desert Storm.

A memorial fund has been established for the children's education. The Norris brothers and Reif were partners in Watson International, a partnership that last January bought the former Heritage Country Club and 9.3 acres of surrounding land for \$1.3 million. They had talked about developing the Tier landmark into a "world-class banquet and entertainment facility." Now those plans are in limbo -- a fourth investor said Saturday he is unsure what Watson International will do. Meanwhile, those close to the slain men are left with memories. "The guys always used to joke about hearing Bob's deep, baritone saying, 'Sir, do not attempt to resist arrest or I will be forced to thrash you,'" said New Castle Cpl. Trinidad Navarro, also a police academy classmate, smiling for one of the few times during a 90-minute interview inside the department's offices. "But he was always able to
